

To all deer count helpers, landholders and members of QDM&CG

The 27th annual end of winter deer count took place on **Sunday 5th March 2017**. A total of 56 volunteers set out before first light in heavy rain, which fortunately cleared just before 7am to give reasonable counting conditions. The usual 44 main counting blocks plus several sub-divisions on the Quantock Hills and selected areas of surrounding land were covered.

After exclusion of probable duplicate sightings; e.g. deer noted to move between blocks during the count, **571** different **red deer** were recorded. Despite the poor weather early on this overall figure for red deer is almost the same as the total recorded in the previous year (578). Numbers of stags (excluding prickets) seen were somewhat lower [2017: 43 young stags and 16 older stags (>4yrs); compared to 66 young and 16 older stags in 2016].

Red deer sightings in count blocks lying south and southeast of Lydeard Hill (7) were again very low. Numbers in 'Central' region (157) were as recent average, while over-two thirds of all red deer sightings were again seen in the 'North' section, showing a small increase there over last year. As always it is important to note that in this annual one-day count we do not presume to see the entire Quantock red deer population, as some will be missed in concealing cover and a proportion of the stags tend to move further off the hills by late winter. The greatest value of the count lies in it being done in the same way year on year, to provide long term trends (see graph overleaf), minimum numbers remaining and a guide to deer distribution.

Whilst the count is designed primarily to record red deer, 124 Roe (incl. at least 23 bucks), and 3 muntjac deer (Holford Coombe) were also reported. As these are the first reports of muntjac in the 'North' section, we'd be grateful if all helpers could keep an eye out for them and let us know of any other sightings & photos of muntjac in the count area over the next twelve months.

We would like to extend our thanks as ever to all the volunteer counters. Many thanks also to all Quantock landholders for continued co-operation with the deer count, and to the Deer Initiative and Quantock Hills AONB service for logistic and financial support.


